1. Remove most adverbs & unnecessary descriptions. "I closed the door loudly with force." v. "I slammed the door."		2. Avoid the passive voice (watch out for was/were, am, is, are). I was running. v. "I ran."			
3. Show, don't tell. "She was hungry." v. "Her stomach rumbled."		4. Remove "that" from sentences. The message is often clearer and is still grammatically correct.			
5. Use "who" not "that" when referring to people.		6. Hyphenate modifiers.			
7. Eliminate redundancies.		8. Avoid clichés (like the plague).			
9. Keep dialogue tags simple. "Said" is not only effect but also considered invisible. Supplement it with <i>action</i> .	ive	10. Split long sentences in two.

21. Maximize descriptions with sensory details. Include smells, sounds, visuals, tastes, & touch/textures.		22. Read your work aloud.

1. Look for weak opening & weak ending.		2. Avoid info dumps.
